
Miss Betts: Sign Language

Year 3 Update



Year 4 Update



School closures and Lock down have certainly brought with it some challenges and changing times but year 4 have risen to the occasion. In order to make their learning as up to date, meaningful and purposeful as possible their learning enquiry question was: Can I record history as it happens?



Class 4, have worked hard at looking at different means of recording history. This has included diary writing, creating time lines, capturing headlines from the latest news. Events such as the Queen's birthday, VE day, and of course the inspirational Captain Tom Moore himself has been featured and captured.

They have captured evidence through photos including images of signs, empty beaches on sunny days and deserted buildings that would normally be crowded. Images that we are unlikely to see again in our lifetime. Interviews have been recorded with their friends and family both near and far and they have applied the skill of using questioning to gather as much information as possible. Their findings have been recorded using a variety of sources such as phone calls, messaging by text, recordings and some even used the wonders of zoom and face time. Just as famous war poets have recorded history through poetry so too has class 4. Learning about acrostic and 'Cinquain' style poems has enabled them to write about the significance of the rainbow during this time and other significant people such as the one and only Joe Wicks who greets us every morning come rain or shine, even with a broken arm!.





Year 5 Update


Its been a very strange couple of months for everyone, but there are still some amazing things going on in year 5 through home learning projects.


Year 6 Update


