**Dear Parents & Carers** 

All of us in school have been delighted with all the parental support as we have been settling the children back into school this term. Despite the new rules around social distancing and having to stay in our bubbles, the children have amazed us with their understanding and adherence to these safety measures.

This first half term, we have been focussing on 'Citizenship' as our character value. There are three aspects to Citizenship: Empathy, Compassion and Drive. On the playground and in class, we have been seeing so many examples of where children have shown real progress in their understanding of what it means to be a caring citizen. Each week, children have been earning their Class Teacher Certificates and Headteacher Awards for demonstrating Citizenship.

New this year has also been the 'Character Cup' as a whole class reward for their collective efforts. Well done to Year 3 who have won this cup more frequently than any other class. I have been particularly impressed by the way in which Year 3 have looked after each other, by carrying each other's coats and bags, giving out books and resources to each other and showing genuine care for each other's feelings. In our twice weekly assemblies, now taking place via Zoom, I have been talking to the children about what it means to be a caring citizen and have been impressed at how the children can reflect honestly about how they interact with others.

There are so many examples of citizenship across our school – from fundraising for GOSH and FOSS, to creating artwork that demonstrates empathy - and not forgetting the anti-bullying campaign spearheaded by our newly elected School Council!

The response to our October Wellbeing challenge has been tremendous.

We have created a display board showing many of our children's achievements. We will give out the bronze/silver/gold awards to children when they bring in their completed challenge sheets after half term.

We couldn't have wished for a more positive, engaging start to the school year and we are immensely grateful for the ways you have supported us. I hope this newsletter gives you a further insight into what the children have been getting up to so far!


Congratulations go to Mrs Geeves, who had her baby Lottie during the summer holidays. Mum and baby are doing well and we look forward to seeing them soon!

# GOSH, what an effort!

On Friday 16th October, every child, from Reception to Year 6, took part in our charity Race For The Kids 5km fundraiser, for Great Ormond Street Hospital (GOSH). What an inspired team of runners they were!

Not only did they enter into the run with smiles and enthusiasm, their drive and determination to do their very best really shone through. In class bubbles, the children ran, with their lap cards in tow, around the school field as many times as they could in their 45-minute slot. The aim was to complete 33 laps, the equivalent of running 5km or just over 3 miles.

So many children achieved this, some went further, and some did all they possibly could in the time they had. They all supported each other so well and carried those struggling over the finish line time and time again. All of the children should feel extremely proud of themselves for such a remarkable effort. And in these difficult times, coming together in this way, as a whole-school community, was just fabulous. Thank you for all your support with the run and for your incredibly generous donations – at the time of writing we're almost at £5000! Team Shaldon you really are an awesome team!











Year 3 has been learning lots of new artistic techniques to help them to paint their own landscape watercolour paintings.

From mixing and blending their own colours and tones, to practising drawing shapes and lines, the children have shown tremendous drive and determination to improve. One highlight was our short field trip to the river, where pupils tried to mix the colours that they could see in the beautiful landscape in front of them. This was an exceptional first trip of the year, and the children showed great attention to detail in picking out all of the different tones that they could see. This was great practise for the children to experiment with the colours that they eventually used for their final masterpieces.





## A World of Colour

This week we took part on a workshop hosted by Parliament's trained education staff, covering topics across the UK curricula.

The session was broadcast live and we were able to ask questions. The children found out more about our local Member of Parliament (MP), how they represent all of us in the House of Commons and the kind of issues they can help with.

Our Art Enquiry has also been going very well. This week, the children have been learning how to mix and blend colours, as well as some basic watercolour techniques. We have some fantastic examples of gradients depicting sunsets, mountains and oceans. The colours were carefully to convey different emotions. Next week, the children will be planning and painting different drafts of their portraits, evaluating them and reflecting about what they have learnt. We will have a virtual gallery to show all grown-ups the amazing artwork that has been produced!







Last year, classes 5 and 6 spent time learning about our local area. In the process, we found out about the save Teignmouth beach campaign.

To make the coastal railway line safer, Network Rail has proposed to move the line further out to sea. As a consequence, a large swathe of Teignmouth's beach would be built on. Many children in the school were naturally worried about losing a part of the beach that they had all played on. We were visited by both the 'Save our Beach' campaigners and Network rail representatives who were able to tell the children both sides of the story. Children were interviewed on BBC Devon radio and were inspired to write letters to Prince Charles (who owns the land), David Attenborough and Network rail to try and stop the proposed works. Yesterday, it has been reported that Network rail will now be changing the plans to avoid losing so much of Teignmouth's beach. Along with the community, it just shows what determined people
