

I have many great memories of this past school year but one of them I need to mention is making a colour wheel with my bubble. I didn't let on that although art is my favourite subject, I have never made a colour wheel and guess what the challenge was? Yes, it was to make one...

The children had gone on their lunch break so I frantically trawled the internet for 'how to' videos. I had paper plates and paint but that was it. I needed to find out how to divide the plate in to equal sections. I folded the plate in half, then quarters, then eighths and so on. It gave me 16 sections and I only needed 12! I found some compasses and had a practice using a ruler... It worked!

The children came back after their lunch and we set to it. We worked systematically, very carefully measuring each section and holding our compasses steady. We watched a video of how to make a colour wheel and again, working systematically, we did it! By the end of the lesson, we had all learnt to divide a circle in to equal sections accurately using a compass and could make 12 different shades from only 3 primary colours. I did let on to the children later that I'd never made a colour wheel before and we'd ALL learnt some new skills that day.

SUMMER SAFETY

As parents will be aware, we are busy preparing to welcome all our children back to school in September. In order to do this, we are ensuring that we are keeping the government guidance very much in mind. In particular, we are working to implement Public Health England's 'System of Controls':

- 1. Minimise contact with individuals who are unwell by ensuring that those who have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or who have someone in their household who does, do not attend school**
- 2. Clean hands thoroughly more often than usual**
- 3. Ensure good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach**
- 4. Introduce enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents and bleach**
- 5. Minimise contact between individuals and maintain social distancing wherever possible**

These controls also apply to any summer holiday provision that children attend. In particular, it is important that parents are aware for the need to minimise contact between individuals and to maintain social distancing wherever possible (see point 5).

For this reason, it would be safest for parents to be selective about any provision that you use over the holiday, and aim for your children to mix with a small consistent group of children or friends, rather than to use a number of different settings e.g. child-minder, sports provision and activity camps.

We all need to maintain vigilance at this time, as some areas of the country are currently experiencing outbreaks and spikes of infection, and testing appears to show that an unexpectedly high number of people may carry Covid 19 without any symptoms. As lots of tourists arrive in Devon over the summer break, it would be great if we could all continue to ensure that we maintain the low level of risk that is currently in the local area.

I would like to wish you and your family a happy, healthy summer, and we look forward to seeing you all in September.
